The history of *Anything Goes*

The original idea for a musical set on board an ocean liner came from producer Vinton Freedley, who was living on a boat, having left the US to avoid his creditors. He selected the writing team, P. G. Wodehouse and Guy Bolton, and the star, Ethel Merman. The first draft of the show was called *Crazy Week*, which became *Hard to Get*, and finally *Anything Goes*.

The original plot centred on a bomb threat, a shipwreck and a group of stranded passengers on a desert island. However, just weeks before the show was due to open, the tragic SS Morro Castle disaster brought unexpected sensitivities to the subject matter. According to one account, producer Vinton Freedley felt audiences might draw uncomfortable parallels and requested revisions to the script. Theatre historian Lee Davis offered a different view, suggesting that Freedley simply believed the story needed significant improvement. With Bolton and Wodehouse in England and unavailable to undertake further rewrites, Freedley turned to director Howard Lindsay to develop a new book. Lindsay, in turn, enlisted press agent Russel Crouse, marking the beginning of a celebrated writing partnership that would last for decades.

Five versions of the libretto exist from the original 1934 version to the most recent 2021 revival starring Sutton Foster as Reno Sweeney.



Synopsis

Anything Goes is a 1934 musical, set aboard the ocean liner SS American, en route from New York to England. As Wall Street broker Billy Crocker helps his boss, Elisha Whitney, prepare for his trip to London he runs into his friend, the evangelist-turned-nightclub singer Reno Sweeney, who is also leaving on the same ship for London. Reno tries unsuccessfully to convince Billy to join her. The next morning, the crew of the SS American prepares to set sail.

Among the passengers is debutante Hope Harcourt, the subject of Billy's infatuation. She is accompanied by her wealthy English fiancé, Lord Evelyn Oakleigh, and her mother, Evangeline Harcourt, who has arranged her daughter's marriage to resolve their family's recent financial struggles. When Billy comes aboard to give Whitney his passport and spots Hope he then stays on the ship to pursue her. Although Hope returns Billy's feelings, she insists on maintaining her duty and marrying Evelyn.

Also hiding on board is America's Public Enemy No.13 Moonface Martin, disguised as a priest. He is joined by Erma, the promiscuous girlfriend of the missing Public Enemy No.1 Snake Eyes Johnson. Billy is apprehended by the crew as a stowaway. Believing him to be Public Enemy No.1 the captain then releases Billy to satisfy the celebrity-crazed passengers, and he basks in the fame of being a gangster until Reno's mock-evangelist cabaret act inspires him to 'confess his sins' and he reveals his identity and his love for Hope.

Reacting to this development, Mrs. Harcourt moves Hope's wedding to Evelyn up to the next morning and Billy and Moonface are locked in 'the Brig' (onboard prison). A heartbroken Hope realizes her chance at true love is over. Later that evening, Reno meets Evelyn on the deck, where he admits that he doesn't love Hope and hints that he has fallen for her instead. In true musical comedy fashion, after switching places with Spit and Dippy Malone, Billy and Moonface escape from their prison in time to stop the wedding. After many confusions are unravelled, three happy couples are then married by the Captain much to the delight of all the celebrating transatlantic passengers and crew.

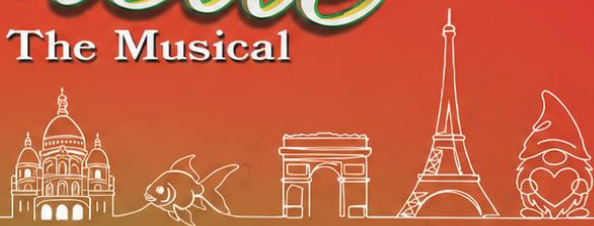
